### Wyoming Welcomes Dr. Rhonda Anderson to Wyoming's State Convention

Northwest regional Director Dr. Rhonda Anderson from Sioux Falls, South Dakota will be the international representative for the state convention in Cheyenne.

Dr. Anderson holds a doctorate in Counseling and Psychology, a Master's of Science in Counseling and Human Resource Development, a Master's of Arts in Counseling and Personnel Services, and Bachelor degrees in German and English.

The experiences of Rhonda are wide and varied. She has been a high school instructor, a university professor, a real estate salesperson,

a governess in Dusseldorf, Germany, a recipient of a Carnegie Mellon Grant, a Fulbright exchange teacher in Munich, Germany, a retail sales clerk, a radio/ TV factory line worker, a landlord, a motel maid, a farmer, a Stephen Ministry Leader, a deacon, an Executive Board member of Church, a volunteer for a community performing arts center, a volunteer for the Banquet (feeding the homeless), an all School Class Reunion President, a mental health therapist to elderly in assisted living, adults in a hospital setting, college students, and children from ages 10 up to 18 in a juvenile detention center, and children from ages 6-10 at Lutheran Social Services. Rhonda has been listed three times in Who's Who Among America's Teachers for high school and universities. She also received the Person Who Makes a Difference Award from the Sioux Falls School District, and has been nominated for teacher of the quarter several times.

Dr. Rhonda Anderson has served on many chapter committees and is currently serving a second term as chapter president. Her first biennium was 2002-2004. Rhonda has served as South Dakota State President and received the South Dakota State Achievement Award.

## Diamond Mines Chapters Report From Around the State

• Chi Chapter—During the holidays, Chi Chapter hosted an annual fundraiser. This year's theme was "Ugly Sweater, Pretty Gift" with 40 members in attendance that also included our new membership nominees. Five hundred dollars was raised in support of our Global Awareness Projects.



In order to become better acquainted with Chi Chapter and DKG International Society's purposes, we conducted an orientation session for 13 new member nominees and 1 transfer in January. Due to a continued loss in active membership after 2 years, a recent change in our process has been to invite candidates only one time during each biennium and to conduct a more extensive orientation process.

Vertical Harvest, a three-story hydroponic greenhouse was the focus of our February programming. VH sells locally grown, fresh vegetables year round to Jackson area restaurants, grocery stores and directly to consumers through on-site sales. As one of our 2017 service projects, members were able to purchase products grown in this facility as well as learn how our chapter can support this nonprofit .

Theta Chapter—The Dual Language Immersion program is currently in place at the newly built Stocktrail Elementary School in Gillette. Through a lottery system 50 Kindergarten and first graders are chosen to participate. They spend half of each day learning to read, write, and speak in English and in Spanish. At the end of the first quarter, Principal Dr. Keri Shannon reported that all students met or exceeded expectations in their grade level in both languages. What's truly awesome about this program is that when these students graduate they will be granted a Seal of Biliteracy which means that they can read, write, and speak two languages. Our district has not yet decided to add Chinese as a second language as other schools have in place at this time.

A new STEM lab is currently in place and being used by each grade level at the St. John Paul II Catholic School here in Gillette. Theta members will tour the lab and witness first hand some of the discoveries that have been made and those in progress.

Sharon Cole spent time with her granddaughter who is studying in Germany and presented some of her adventures.
