Increase your chapter membership with new membership plan

2015-16 can be the best year ever for your chapter's membership! International President Dr. Lyn Schmid shared her vision for membership with those of us who attended the Northwest Regional Conference in Regina, SK. The new membership plan that has been unveiled is definitely user friendly and will have everyone in your chapter thinking about membership!

The entire plan is outlined on the dkg.net website but here is a quick overview:

- Members will recommend potential members for membership by completing a prospect card. Think about everyone you would love to have in your chapter and consider honoring them with the choice of joining DKG---don't assume they will say no!
- At a chapter meeting you will have the opportunity to vote on offering membership to the list of prospective members. The recommended members aren't contacted before your chapter votes.
- After the chapter has agreed to offer the invitation of membership a form letter is sent inviting them to find out more about DKG at an orientation. The form letter is

- already developed for you! A buddy is assigned to each prospective member.
- Each prospective member is assigned a buddy who attends orientation with them and will help them complete the chapter member application.
- Some will respond positively that they are planning to attend, some will decline and some may call with questions.
- At orientation you will be able to show the DKG DVD, Pride in the Big Picture. Members can answer questions of their buddy. Each prospective member should be asked whether they are interested in joining at the end of the orientation meeting.
- New members will be invited to an initiation ceremony.
 Again the letter is already created for you!

Increasing membership has never been easier! Just be willing to ask---you will be amazed at how this completely prepared system will work for your chapter! If each of us successfully asks just one new member we can double our membership statewide!

Helpful Hints from the Treasurer

What a learning curve to learn to set up the STEF -18 Program. I appreciate all the past treasurers and their hard work at this job. I also appreciate all the chapter treasurers that have this figured out.

Did you know that if you go to dkg.org and go to the finance committee that you will find short power points on "Available Fund", "The Power of Member Dues", and "You Own a Building"? Chapter Presidents, this will be a great way to help your members see where their money goes.

Many chapters find it financially difficult to make ends meet. There is an international committee on non-dues-revenue. They have a brochure listing some examples. In Regina I went to a break out session entitled "Fill Your Bucket With Cash and Savings." Here are some ideas I heard about:

- ✦Hold a sale such as used books, jewelry, purses, baked goods,
- ◆Be part of a Christmas bazaar and sell Christmas items

- **♦**Make and sell cookbooks
- ✦Hold an event such as scrapbooking night, charge for a place and meals
- **♦**Work for Pay

There are good buys, discounts and cash available to DKG members such as insurance, university courses, scholarships and grants. DKG is also offering a tour to England, Scotland and Ireland. Check it out on dkg.org.

"Nominations Guidelines" shall be followed, and the nominee's information shall be provided following the "Resume Outline" set forth in the Alpha Xi Achievement Award Packet.

When you walk out of Delta Kappa Gamma meetings, what are you communicating?


