She returned to Campbell County in 1979 and taught at different schools in different capacities until her retirement in 2009. She currently resides in Gillette.

Many honors both professionally and personally have been given to Sally. In 1972 she was a member of the delegation representing Wyoming at the National Education Association convention in Atlantic City. She also has had her paintings displayed in various locations in Gillette. Her community service includes the following: P.E.O. Sisterhood, Eat. Read. Grow., Retired Teachers Association, Senior Center, and The Red Hat Society. She attends St. Matthew's Catholic Church where she serves on the Funeral Dinner Ministry and the Council of Catholic Women.



In September we met at Healthstyles Market and gained helpful information on how to keep ourselves well with food, exercise, and sleep.



I told about a DKG friend in Texas who is heading up efforts to support schools and members. I now have that information that I am passing along to you. Below you will find the body of the email I received from Cookee Johnson who is heading up the efforts for assistance. Her contact information is at the conclusion of her email. Basically she outlines two ways to help. One is called Member to Member and this is where individuals or chapters contribute funds to pay the dues of a Texas DKG member for the year. The other is called Campus Helping Hands. This is where assistance is provided to a school that is assigned to a member or chapter for whatever assistance is pledged. Please note that these schools may have DKG members but it is not a guarantee. The effort is targeted at making sure children have what they need. Once your chapter has chosen which avenue to support, you fill out the form and money and send it to Cookee at the address she provides in her email.

I hope this helps you in deciding how to best support those in need. Of course, your chapter could also choose to send in a contribution to the Emergency Fund at DKG International. We have members in Texas, Florida, California and Puerto Rico who definitely have used this fund for their assistance this fall. Remember to send Shirley Tranas an email that tells what you contributed so she can note that in the Alpha Xi treasurer's reports.

Cookee Johnson, Coordinator, Campus Helping Hands, Texas State DKG Organization, writes:

"We have two parts to our campaign: Member to Member and Campus Helping Hands. MTM is our initiative to help members who are financially unable to pay their dues because of recovery restraints on their budget. So we have a form which chapters can complete and pay membership dues of \$80.00 for those members so they won't be dropped by International.

My part of the campaign is CHH. I have a list of many schools all along the coast who have told us about delay of schools, students being displaced to other schools, families have moved and cannot send their kids to school yet, and even some schools that will not open till Spring or even until next year. So I am enclosing a form to be completed by a chapter/individual letting me know which level of school they would like to help. At this point, Wal-Mart, Target, and other retails have taken care of school supplies, but administrators have told me what is needed most is money to replace those items teachers need in the classroom and workroom, and Amazon cards so teachers can purchase what they need for their classroom, usually with free postage. You can imagine the tremendous task of receiving membership dues right now at Headquarters, so all CHH checks/cards and forms are mailed to me for processing and then I will send on to HQ to bank while we make arrangements to assist the schools on my list."


