

Pauline passed away on March 11, 2019, in Coalgate, OK., at the age of 93 years. She was born on December 21, 1925 in Cole, OK. Pauline started teaching in a one room schoolhouse in Coal, Co. at the age of 20 years old. She dedicated her life to learning and teaching others. Pauline retired in 1984 in Rawlins, Wyoming after 40 years of teaching. She and her husband Leon spent their winters with family and friends in

Get Membership Help From Current Members!

Membership in organizations around the world is decreasing; people are busy, don't have the money for membership, don't understand the benefits, or don't feel useful in the organization. These are valid reasons not to join or reasons to quit an organization; we can all agree on that! However, there are hundreds of ways to get and retain members in DKG; just google it!

After listening to numerous members talk about methods of gaining and retaining members and talking at length about the issue with my own local chapter, I feel like the best way is to get help from current members. Here are 5 outstanding ways to utilize current members to gain and retain members.

Get Help from Current Members

- **1.Host a "bring a friend" meeting** Encourage members to bring someone. This could even be a recurring event so that new members are continually bringing new friends!
 - 2.Reach out to former members Some people might be ready to come back.
 - 3.Encourage members to share your newsletter Especially if they're featured in it!
- **4.Invite members' families to events** Spouses, siblings, parents, and (grown-up) children are all potential members (depending on the type of membership you offer).
- **5.Help members develop an "elevator speech" about their membership** Why are they members? What's the biggest benefit of membership? Can they explain the purpose of the chapter?

Message from the Treasurer

The treasurer's job took on a whole new look this year. We have talked about it for a couple of years . We had training on-line and then we had hands on training last April. Paying dues is on-line. Chapter treasurers pay their chapter dues and update emails and addresses. International sends out dues reminders throughout the summer so members learn to get dues paid as soon after July 1 as possible. The first reminder is July 15.

We no longer pay any scholarship fees and initiation fees to International. Each member pays a dollar for scholarship fees. If the chapter has a scholarship fund, they keep \$0.80 and pay the state \$0.20 for each member. If there is no scholarship fund, they pay a \$1.00 to state for each member. Initiation fees are \$10.00 for each new member. The chapter keeps \$7.50 and sends \$2.50 to state.

One report I have had trouble receiving the last few years is Form 6 (Death of a member). This report goes to International, State Treasurer and State Second Vice President (Carrie Manders). If your chapter has someone that has passed away after March 15, 2019 until now, please fill out the form and send it out.

Last year we lost two more chapters. We are feeling the loss this year. To make the budget balance, we needed to add a little over \$1,000 to miscellaneous receipts. Any ideas for a money maker?



Glenda Reynolds, Phi Chapter member and state editor, has been selected to be the nominee for the International Finance Committee. The International Finance Committee is responsible for proposing guidelines for international Executive Board approval with respect to the investment of funds, for preparation of the Available Fund budget for adoption by the international Executive Board and for provision for an annual audit.

Glenda is a past Northwest Regional Director. She has held many positions in Wyoming and presently serves on the International Non-Dues Revenue Committee. Glenda has served at the international level on the Educational Excellence Committee, Expansion Committee, Communications Committee, Scholarship Committee, Personal Growth and Services Committee, and has chaired the Communication and Publicity Committee.



In 2017, she earned her Masters in Educational Administration and Supervision of Curriculum and Instruction from Chadron State College. This year, Valerie is learning with her 10th group of first graders at Rozet Elementary School in Campbell County School District #1 and cannot believe she gets to do what she has been called to do each

and every day. She is passionate about all things education but has recently found a fire for supporting teachers and leaders in the work they do to ensure ALL learners have the best opportunity to grow, persevere, and fall in love with learning. Valerie was inducted into Gillette's DKG Chapter in August and provided the September program in her classroom. My Journey as Wyoming's 2019 Teacher of the Year

Valerie Bruce ~ First Grade Teacher ~ Rozet Elementary School Gillette, Wyoming

This all began with a twinkly eyed, rosy cheeked, first grader who had the amazing ability to ask a question about his question before you could respond to his initial question, with the biggest smile on his face!

In February 2018, I received an email from my Superintendent, Dr. Alex Ayers, notifying me that I had been nominated for Campbell County School District's Teacher of the Year and that I would need to fill out the application to move further in the process. Upon reading the nomination information from that rosy cheeked boy's mother I was beyond touched that she had taken the time to nominate me. I realized just what an amazing career teaching is and what an opportunity we must positively impact our students and their families during our time learning together. After interviewing with a



panel of 12 members, I was recognized and named as CCSD #1's Teacher of the Year. I was able to celebrate with my family and my Marigolds, like Jennifer Gonzalez who wrote about them in her 2013 piece, One Essential Rule For New Teachers: Find Your Marigold. After making it to the top five candidates based on the application, I then went through an interview process with the Wyoming Department of Education. From there, I was selected for the top three, my next task was to submit a teaching video just two weeks into the new school year, August 2018.

Fast forward to October and I had not heard about the award yet, and I enter my school gymnasium on a student concern call to find my entire school, my family, and school board members silently waiting to surprise me with the news of being named the 2019 Wyoming Teacher of the Year. Past students of mine held the banner as I entered the gym and I was able to enjoy a video compilation of students sharing what they remembered about our classroom and me. What an experience!!! I

will never forget that moment for as long as I live,

so much joy, pride, and excitement throughout my entire school community and family.

My first official commitment as the 2019 Wyoming Teacher of the Year was speaking at the Wyoming School Boards Association, in November.

The organization who runs the National Teacher of the Year program is the Council of Chief and State School Officers (CCSSO). CCSSO partnered with Google for Education to host our Induction Week in San Jose, and San Francisco, California in February of 2019. During our time together we

learned about the power of story-telling, how crucial our teacher voice is in advocacy and policy, and we were empowered to think, plan, and create our action steps for impacting change for our kids as Teachers of the Year.

One of the most amazing parts of this experience was meeting the other 56 representatives from the U.S. Territories, Department of Defense Education Activities, and State Teachers of the Year. I was told by Wyoming's past representatives that we would form a family bond, and they were right! These individuals are amazing educators and I am so blessed to know them.

One of my primary goals for my work this year has been to grow the program within our state and work to build connections across district lines, celebrate and elevate our profession, and educators, as well as inspire, encourage, and empower educators during speaking

opportunities, sessions, workshops, and meetings. Through this work I have identified three of my passion projects: working with early service/preservice educators, the power of connection, and early literacy.

In Wyoming, the privilege of the floor is given to the State Teacher of the Year during the Legislative Session in both the Senate and the House. On February 14, 2019, I addressed both chambers and shared about our kids and what a powerful role education plays in our communities. During this experience, I was able to video chat with my students and show them where I was. Sharing their story and this experience with them has been the most rewarding part of this.

One of Pauline's lifetime achievements was authoring the book "A Colossal Fossil and The Life Story of Leon Lanoy", a Tiger Medallion Award, by ECU for Philanthropy in 2008. In 2009 they were inducted into the Educator's Hall of Fame and in 2016 the Education Building at ECU was named the Lanoy Building in their honor. She received Teacher of the Year in 1977. Pauline received the Wyoming State Organization Delta Kappa Gamma achievement award.

Pauline had a life well lived. Wyoming State Organization will miss her.
