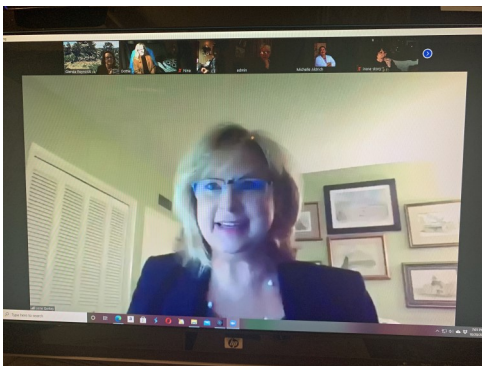

Lorie Gerkey, special education attorney from Albuquerque, NM and part of her audience engage in a discussion time.

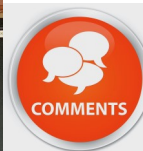

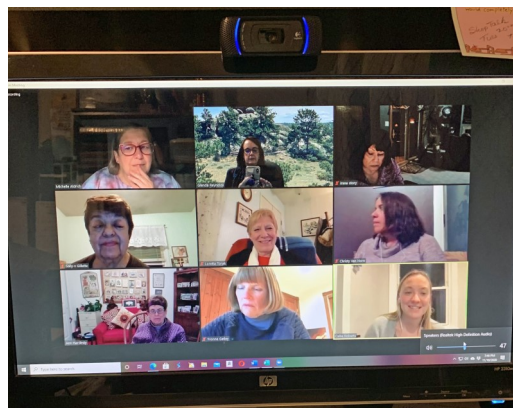

Online Experiences Are Available to All Chapters and Members

This past summer the DKG International Convention was held virtually. Many of the speakers were recorded and are currently still accessible online for your use personally and as a chapter. I would like to highlight a few of them and encourage you to listen to some great ideas.

Go to the dkg.org website and log in using your membership number which is on your membership card and create a password. Across the top banner select the “Events” category and scroll down and select “2020 Virtual Event”. On the Virtual Event page select “schedule”. This will bring up a large selection of videos of speakers. I would like to recommend listening to the short videos on our “Core Values 1-5”. These are listed under the “Develop Deeper Understanding of DKG” category. These would work well at a chapter meeting virtually or in person. The other excellent video is “DKG and UNICEF”. This video is 27 minutes and gives an up to date look at what DKG and UNICEF have been able to accomplish in the last 10 years of our collaboration. There are two other excellent videos each an hour in length from the convention that I found very interesting: Jane Golden’s keynote speech on Community Murals and our new international president, Becky Sandowski’s, acceptance speech, are informational and challenging. Again, these can be found on the “Virtual Event” page.

If you are looking for other great project and program ideas, click on the “committees” green box on the dkg.org home page. Scroll down to Training Videos and find EEC training (with 2 great videos); Best Chapter Projects (with a great list of ideas); and Helping New Teachers. Many virtual ideas are suggested such as recording yourself reading a book to share with a classroom; have a book chat; do a virtual tour of an art museum or zoo; view a live performance of an opera or concert; or do an online yoga class. I also encourage you to align your chapter programming with your member interests and needs. Survey your members about their interest in our goals and Strategic Action Plan. Support our international projects: Schools for Africa, Early Educators: the UN and CTAUN in your chapter by again finding information on the DKG website.

Another “online” experience is to “like” the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International Facebook page. Many members post events, speakers, trainings, and interesting information for your use. There are many Facebook chapter pages to follow as well for ideas and information. So even though you may not be getting to personally interact with other members, there are many, many electronic options by which to keep informed of all that DKG is doing. And finally, I hope we WILL be able to see you all in person this next spring. Our state meeting, workshops, banquet, and installation of officers will be held in Newcastle with a date to be determined soon.

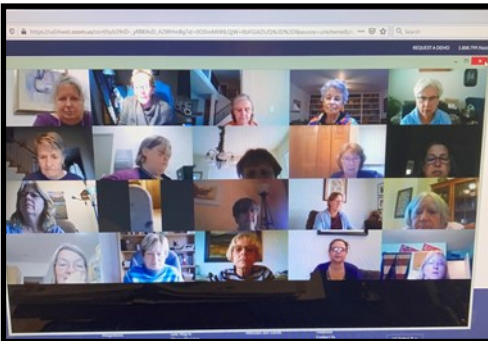
