Educational Excellence is a focus of all local, state and international chapters of Delta Kappa Gamma. Sadly, we see new teachers, as well as master teachers, leaving the profession at a fast rate. The following information are results from national survey teacher attrition and mobility (found at www.dkg.org)

Of the teachers who began teaching in public schools in 2007 or 2008, about 10 percent were not teaching in 2008–09, and 12 percent were not teaching in 2009–10.

Among beginning public school teachers who were assigned a mentor in 2007–08, about 8 percent were not teaching in 2008–09 and 10 percent were not teaching in 2009–10. In contrast, among the beginning public school teachers who were not assigned a mentor in 2007–08, about 16 percent were not teaching in 2008–09 and 23 percent were not teaching in 2009–10.

Approximately 93 percent of beginning public school teachers who were earning less than \$40,000 in 2008–09 remained teachers in 2009–10, and about 96 percent of beginning public school teachers who were earning \$40,000 or more in 2008–09 remained teachers in 2009–10.

Of the beginning public school teachers, about 74 percent were teaching in the same school in 2009–10 as in the previous school year (stayers), about 10 percent were teaching in a different school in 2009–10 than the previous school year (movers), about 3 percent had returned to teaching in 2009–10 after a year of not teaching (returners), and about 12 percent were not teaching in 2009–10.

Approximately 21 percent of 2008–09 movers and 27 percent of 2009–10 movers moved across schools because their contract was not renewed. About 31 percent of 2008–09 leavers and 35 percent of 2009–10 leavers left the teaching profession because their contract was not renewed.

These results show how important it is that we, DKG chapters, find ways to support and mentor new teachers. Our programs are a huge way we can support these teachers. They can provide professional development, opportunities for PTSB credit, and provide mentorships they may not be receiving in our schools. It is important to survey your chapter to find out their needs, then choose quality programs to meet those needs. High interest, quality program ideas can be found at www.dkg.org.

month, or send notes and cards liberally. Pinterest has a ton of ideas on how to show members they are appreciated.

During the month of February our Chapter has a membership appreciation dinner and we celebrate our newest members that were initiated in December as well as our continuing members. This dinner helps us to kick off our Annual Used Book Sale and gather for a time of fun as we participate in a white elephant gift exchange of things we received for Christmas that we would like to regift! Many of our members report this as one of their favorite meetings.

Research shows that keeping members is more cost effective and efficient than recruiting new members. We know that we must be recruiting new members because members retire, move, life happens and for a myriad of reasons they leave. Imagine if you were able to recruit new members and maintain all of your current members. How you show appreciation for your members isn't as important as just doing it!

Apply for the Alpha Xi Scholarship

Alpha Xi State Scholarship

Due April 1, 2016 (no late applications will be accepted)

The Alpha Xi State Scholarship for graduate and postgraduate work is awarded to active members who have been in Alpha Xi State, Delta Kappa Gamma for at least two years. One scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00 will be announced at the Alpha Xi State Leadership Workshop, April 30, in Casper.

Alpha Xi State Regulations:

- 1. The Alpha Xi State Scholarship is available to active members in good standing in a chapter of Alpha Xi State of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International for at least two (2) years. Preference will be given to members who have shown leadership in Delta Kappa Gamma.
- 2. An applicant must be accepted for graduate work in an approved institution of higher learning. If postgraduate studies have been pursued, the applicant must be in good standing.
- 3. An applicant must plan to use the scholarship for pursuing graduate work or seeking an advanced degree.
- 4. An applicant must be currently employed in educational work or be planning to return to employment in the field of education upon completion of graduate studies.
- 5. Previously unsuccessful applicants may apply again, but recipients are ineligible for future scholarships.

Here are the steps: Bring a device (laptop, smartphone) that will access the Internet. Each member needs her membership number (found on membership card). To ensure all numbers are readily available, ask the treasurer to bring her list with the membership numbers. Go to http://www.dkg.org and to the Sign in button at the top of the page (on the new website). User name is the membership number, and the initial password has been given to chapter and state organization presidents (Call Society Headquarters: 512 478-5748, if needed). Create a Member Profile. One can enter her birth date with the year, but only the month and day will show to others.

This profile will allow one to do many things such as change her contact information, register for events such as regional conferences and international conventions, order from the DKG Store, and join different communities to discuss educational issues with DKG members from across the globe.
