Programs and Projects Focus our Society

As State First Vice President, my duties include keeping you informed of Educational Excellence in our organization. Internationally this committee promotes programs and projects that focus on topics adopted by the Society. Currently, these areas are Schools for Africa, Support for Early Career Educators (SEE), Advocating for educational law, and promoting United Nations activities. I will be speaking on each of these areas in our spring training on April 25 which will be done online on that day. I would love for each chapter to share with all who are connected that day about some of their chapter projects in each of those focus areas.

In our own Kappa Chapter here in Sheridan we have done some of the following projects. We have not directly given to Schools for Africa, but we have encouraged global awareness by holding a Literacy Day with district ESL students and parents. We read books in Spanish, had treats, played games, and connected with them on a social level to help them feel comfortable with teachers and resources available. We have also donated to a school in Puerto Rico after the hurricane there to help with supplies.

In supporting Early Career Educators, we gave out welcome bags provided by a local bank to all new female teachers in the district. We add snacks and goodies and a pamphlet describing DKG and our chapter. We also have given young educators a chance to educate the older members in coding, a subject done in after school programs in our district. We hold a social evening with wine and cheese to welcome prospective young members and tell them about DKG.

In the fourth focus area of Educational Excellence DKG is very involved in supporting activities of the United Nations. Beginning in 1995, DKG has played an instrumental role as a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) with the United Nations Department of Public Information. NGO's are closely involved with the economic and social life of the peoples of the areas they represent and whose membership is broadly representative of major segments of society in many countries in different regions of the world. This fulfills the seventh Society Purpose: To inform members of current economic, social, political and educational issues so that they may participate effectively in a world society. On a local level our chapter has become "involved with the economic and social life of the peoples of the area" by helping with a Habitat for Humanity build and one of our members is a sponsor for a family that will soon receive a Habitat home. We also are going to help with a preschool "Children's Day" event where we dress up as storybook characters and interact with the kids. And finally, we have adopted a single mom through the local Legacy Pregnancy Center to help with her college expenses and provide encouragement during stressful times.

Some other fun activities we have done this year as a chapter include birdwatching and helping one of our members write and publish her own children's book on birds. We got up early "with the birds" one morning last fall and took our binoculars to a local wooded area and listened and spotted many types of local birds. After the chilly hours outdoors, we gathered at a local cafe for breakfast. Our member who is writing the book has applied for a



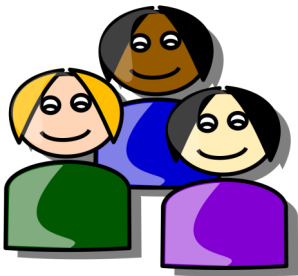

Life-Long Friendships Are Built In DKG

We can agree that building life-long friendships is one of the best benefits of Delta Kappa Gamma. Member engagement is a difficult achievement in any chapter with a diversity of members; seasoned, new, retired, mothers, coaches, and so on. To keep all members excited about what the chapter is doing becomes a struggle. One question we must try to answer is how do we engage new members?

Once the member is inducted, how do we keep her? No matter what personality type the new member has, we must make sure she feels welcomed at every meeting. One proven way of success includes the assignment of a **sponsor** or “buddy.”

Our brand-new members need to start the process of building lifelong friendships from their very first meeting. We need to help them build connections with all the members, so they experience the joy of membership right away. The assigned sponsor plays a critical role in this process by assisting the new member as she becomes oriented to the chapter and DKG, makes new friends, and learns about the many benefits of membership.

As a sponsor/buddy, consider the following tips:

- **During Orientation**

Help with the completion of the chapter application/recommendation form
 Help her determine what job/committee she would like to do
 Answer any questions she may have
 Get to know each other

- **During the Induction ceremony**

Introduce her to the chapter
 Accompany her through the meeting to introduce her to members and make her feel comfortable.

- **For the First Meeting**

Call the new member to be sure she knows the details
 Offer a ride to the meeting
 Plan to meet her outside and walk in together
 introduce her to one or two members

- **During the year**

Help her in attending meeting
 Help her get involved in chapter activities
 Encourage her to enrich her membership experience beyond the chapter by attending local, state, regional and international events

These are basic, yet imperative, steps to engage every member within your chapter. New members need to know every benefit of DKG membership; but most importantly they must feel the life-long friendships that are built through our organization.

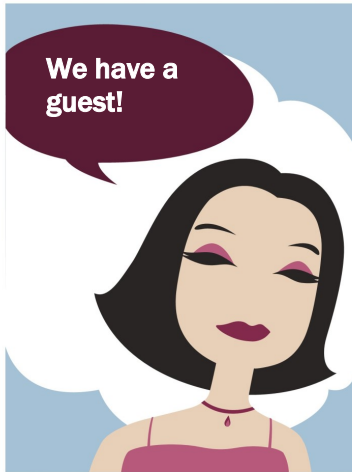

Phi Chapter Phi Chapter members care deeply about Cheyenne and its people. Our meetings reflect that commitment.

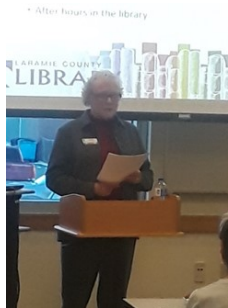

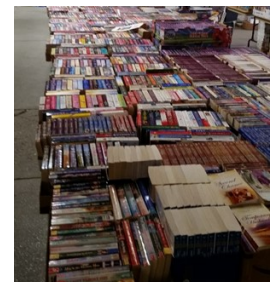

Apply Now for the Wyoming State Scholarship



Due April 1, 2020

- No late applications will be accepted
- Applications may be submitted by postal mail or email.

The Wyoming State Scholarship for graduate and postgraduate work is awarded to active members who have been in the Wyoming State Delta Kappa Gamma for at least two years. One scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00 will be announced during the at the Spring Wyoming State Workshop.

Wyoming State Regulations:

1. The Wyoming State Scholarship is available to active members in good standing in a chapter of the Wyoming State of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International for at least two (2) years. Preference will be given to members who have shown leadership in Delta Kappa Gamma.
2. An applicant must be accepted for graduate work in an approved institution of higher learning. If postgraduate studies have been pursued, the applicant must be in good standing.
3. An applicant must plan to use the scholarship for pursuing graduate work or seeking an advanced degree.
4. An applicant must be currently employed in educational work or be planning to return to employment in the field of education upon completion of graduate studies.
5. Previously unsuccessful applicants may apply again, but recipients are ineligible for future scholarships.

Directions for Applying for the Scholarship:

1. The form can be found by clicking on the link [Scholarship Application Form](#) or on the Wyoming State Website: www.wydkg.weebly.com
2. The application must be returned to the state chairperson, Dr. Irene Story, no later than April 1 of the year the scholarship is desired.
3. The applicant must submit three (3) letters of recommendation from persons qualified to speak specifically of character, ability, and scholarship. These letters should include a current professional co-worker and the chapter president.

General Conditions of Acceptance:

1. Within two (2) weeks after the successful applicant is notified of her selection, she must notify the state scholarship chairperson of her acceptance of the award and provide a picture.
2. No funds will be disbursed until the photo is received.
3. The acceptance of a scholarship implies the obligation on the part of the recipient to devote herself unreservedly to study within the field of education.
4. Upon completion of the session for which the scholarship is awarded, the recipient will advise the scholarship chairperson of her progress.

Payment of Scholarship: Payment to the recipient will be made by the State Treasurer.

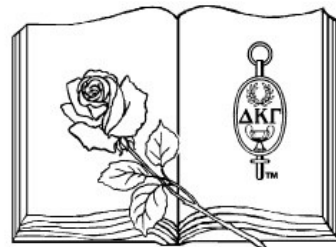
