It also shows our state membership total is 230 members in 10 chapters. Of course, as membership chair, I would love to see that number double. DKG has SO much to offer women educators, that we should be gathering in new members without any problem. There is a wealth of information about membership on the dkg.org website for you to use as well. Please access it for help in building your chapters. If you've never logged on, you'll need your membership ID number which your chapter treasurer can provide, or I can email it to you. Just contact me at tonak@wavecom.net. When you bring up the website click on "sign in", enter your membership ID number and the password: dkg2014society. Proceed to "my account" (at the left top of the website) and create a new password of your choice to continue logging in the future.

Besides providing you with this information you can find on the international website, I would like to detail what other things I do as state membership chair. According to our state bylaws:

- 1. *Membership Chair should keep an up-to-date file of state presidents, and members.* This is an easy task with the "state connect" information on the dkg.org site.
- 2. Keep informed of any deaths of members. It is also the duty of the membership chair to plan and perform the necrology service for the state convention every two years. This is a beautiful time of remembering all the amazing women who were a part of our organization and all their outstanding achievements. So please send me the names and obituaries of any members who have passed away.
- 3. Assist members in building their chapter membership roster. On the dkg.org website under "resources" there is a tab for membership which includes hundreds of forms, plans, and videos to help you induct new members and retain your current ones. Some of these include "engaging new members", "guidelines for chapter leaders", and a "membership plan," There are videos on "attracting new members", "mentoring", "marketing", and "building vital chapters."



Do you know an early career educator who could use some additional funding? If you do, then the Wyoming State Organization SEE Grant-in-Aid is available. Due to the generosity of the Beth Schiek Miller Scholarship Fund, our SEE Grants-in-Aid are seeded with a \$500 appropriation to start our fund for this year's awardees. Additionally, chapters are collecting funds to add to these awards.

Wyoming State Organization SEE Grant-in-Aid is now accepting applications for this funding opportunity for early-career educators. Applications are due by April 1.

Early-career educators are defined as having 1-5 years of experience. Many studies show early-career educators greatly appreciate efforts to assist them by providing grants in their early years. These grants can support a variety of needs that can include but are not limited to:

- classroom library
- professional/personal development
- technology
- science and/or craft materials
- classroom supplies
- subscriptions

Depending on the amount collected, at least two \$250 grants will be awarded – one to a DKG member and one to a non-DKG member – on April 20th at our Wyoming State Organization Leadership Development meeting – Progress, Pride, and the Power of Connection in Cheyenne, Wyoming.

GREAT NEWS! You can apply for a stipend to attend the International Convention in National Harbor, Maryland, this summer from July 9-13. Because of a very generous bequest to our WySO from the Beth Schieck trust, the WySO board voted at our fall meeting to allow \$1500 for a member to go to their first international convention. And even better, there is a second stipend of \$1500 for ANY member to assist them in attending the International Convention. An application form will be sent out in mid-March for you to complete, and the stipends will be awarded at our Leadership Conference in April.

The International Convention registration is \$575 for the full five days, including some meals and all the workshops, speakers, business meetings, and general sessions. You can also register for just two days at \$350. The convention is held at the National Harbor Gaylord Hotel. Rooms are \$199 per night, but we usually share rooms, so your total cost for a five-night room would be around \$250. That would still leave you around \$800 for travel and other expenses from the stipend. So, mark your calendar and apply for this fantastic opportunity!
