Decision Time – What do you choose?



You arrive home. It's been a long day. You are looking forward to unwinding and some relaxation. But wait, you realize you had better check your calendar. You have a feeling there is something scheduled for tonight. Sure enough! You have a Delta Kappa Gamma meeting. It is now time for a decision, do you stay home and relax, or do you grab a quick dinner and head out the door to your chapter meeting?

Sound familiar? Ever happen to you? In this hectic and busy world, attendance at meetings has taken a hit. It is not just Delta Kappa Gamma, but most organizations have experienced a loss of members and in participation of those who remain. What are the keys to sustaining your chapter and in attracting your members for your scheduled meetings?

According to a survey conducted in 2008 by The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, there are many characteristics that exemplify a successful chapter. For the purpose of this article, I will focus on those that pertain most to programs. Consider the following as a checklist for your chapter as your plans emphasize the Society's mission, purposes, and history.

A successful chapter —has fellowship time as part of each meeting.

• What do you do in your meetings that allows for the social need of building camaraderie? Sometimes this is the only time these current and past educators see each other to chat and connect.

—has a wide variety of highquality, interesting programs and speakers, including programs that highlight community initiatives and those that use members' talents/expertise.

• This is probably the most important characteristic to attract members to chapter meetings.

Survey your members as to their talents and abilities to participate. ► Also, survey to find their interests and needs regarding programs.

-has open meetings and activities that welcome non-members.

• Your friend or your neighbor may be very interested in this month's program. Non-members can share in the knowledge or participate with other like-minded women.

- One-time projects are doable because of the minimal time commitment.
- Ongoing projects often give a chapter an identity because they are known for providing a service or a contribution in the community.

 —plans for meetings that involve members in <u>each</u> program, whether by icebreaker, group discussion, participation in planned activity, question-and-answer period, and/or evaluation.
 —implements formal and traditional initiation and installation ceremonies.

• These are very meaningful to members; whether a new initiate or a 20 year anniversary member.

One final thought – Each member must be inspired to feel excited about coming to Society events and contributing to the fullest. This happens only when practices and policies are followed that engage the hearts and minds of all those who participate. How can you ensure this success through the programs in your chapter? Do you choose to engage?

They may find they really enjoy coming to the meetings, and will later be able to stay for the entire meeting and socialize more. Have your meetings organized so a lot of time is not wasted with trivial items. This can also leave more time to socialize after the formal meeting. Younger members want a purpose to belong. They want to help others.

These are just a few ways to nurture members, but every idea may help a few more members to continue to be members.

Cornetet Awards were first given in 2005. Since that time five from Wyoming have received Professional Development Awards. They are Pamela Arps, Michelle Aldrich, Kelly Vazis,

Bridget Leonhardt, and Carolyn Sanchez. Total amount awarded May 2005 through February 2010 for Professional Development Awards has equaled \$269,412.82. In 2010 39 projects received renewed funds, 34 more were new projects which were funded. \$133,735.00 equaled total renewed and new projects funded. Wyoming received one of the first Professional Seminar awards for the Leadership Development Seminar held in Casper in June 2005. The International Constitution and Revision Committee has published the proposed Constitution and Standing Rules in the specially designed issue of the NEWS and on the Society web site. "The committee listened to your concerns and read all of the items that you sent us. We worked hard to craft a Constitution and International Standing Rules document that reflected forward thinking. Read the one you received. Be ready to vote on it at the convention. I encourage you to take time to talk about it at your state meeting," states International President Carolyn Rants. The last major revision of the Constitution was in 1982 at the Atlanta,

Georgia convention. There will be an opportunity for questions and answers during the Tues., June 15, morning session facilitated by Northwest Regional Director Glenda Reynolds. Voting will take place at the 2010 International Convention in Spokane, Washington.

Judging will be at the spring Executive Board meeting in Gillette June 15 - 17 in conjunction with the Leadership Development Seminar. Prizes are \$30 for first place, \$20 for second place and \$10 for third place.

Does Your Chapter Donate to World Fellowships?

Ann Marie Custis, Alpha Xi State's World Fellowship chairman, encourages all chapters to donate to the World Fellowship Fund. World Fellowships are directly related to the purposes of the Society, "...to grant fellowships to women from other countries." The World Fellowships Program began in 1946 as a project to aid women in war-torn countries. Through the years the program grew and to date more than 555 women from over 100 countries have received fellowships to enable them to pursue advanced study in the United States and Canada.
